Herbert also from Atlanta, Georgia, and all of them older than I and we were in the same church at home. He took a leave and my roommate who was from Morgan College and I went there to be with them, and returned back. O out of that particular activity the court paying, paying no attention to what we had to say, sometime during that summer, they eliminated
